Our school continues to be a popular choice for our local community with our enrolments growing to 1,301 students. Our Co-Education Campus is at capacity and there is a small amount of space in some year levels within the Girls' Education Campus and the Special Education Campus.

Congratulations to the Class of 2015

Every year our SACE completion rate has improved and this year we are proud to announce that 96% of our 2015 Year 12 students across the three campuses successfully achieved their SACE, with many of our students receiving an ATAR (Australian Tertiary Admissions Rank) score in the 90's, 80's and 70's.

We congratulate Shamsiya Mohammadi, who will be awarded the 2015 Dux of the School for achieving the top raw ATAR score of 95.95 and a final ATAR score of 99.75 with bonus points, at our next school assembly. She intends to study a Bachelor of Journalism / International Relations at UniSA. Shamsiya has also been awarded with a CAS Hawker Scholarship, which is another outstanding achievement. Applicants came from across Australia for these prestigious scholarships and she was selected based on her personal qualities and demonstrated leadership as well as her academic ability.

Ninety-eight University and TAFE offers were made to our students, such as Law, Engineering, Medical Sciences, Medical Radiation Science, Psychology, Commerce, Health Sciences, Teaching, Nursing, Justice, Journalism, Business, Information Technology, Arts, Nutrition, Science, Science Technology, Interior Decorator, Sound Production, Animal Studies, Beauty, Criminology, Graphic Design, Aviation, Sport and Rec Management, Aged Care, Fitness, Building & Construction, Photo Imaging, Hospitality, Disability, Community Services.

We congratulate the Class of 2015 for achieving their SACE and being accepted into University, TAFE, training, employment or a community program. Our school community wishes our graduates every success in their chosen pathway.

These 'snapshot' grades will be posted home to you by the end of week five and teachers will also have opportunities to give students feedback on how they can improve their grade by the end of the term. If you are concerned about your son or daughter's progress in any subject please contact the teacher by ringing the school or by emailing the teacher. If you are having difficulty contacting individual teachers please contact me. Please don't hesitate to work closely with your son or daughter's teachers in order to support their learning. We know that working together really helps young people to improve.

Pastoral Care Program

Our weekly pastoral care lessons provide opportunities for students to work with their care group teacher to consolidate their learning. Students will be involved in a wide range of programs and activities that include:

- * Preparing for sports day, exams, course counselling, IBMYP Personal Project and SACE Personal Learning Plan round table discussions;
- * Participating in goal setting activities, SRC and House Captain elections, SRC class meetings, House meetings, Keeping Safe: Child Protection Curriculum, tertiary information sessions, road awareness program, transition pathway planning and year level, campus and whole school assemblies;
- * Reviewing mid term/snapshot grades and then working with their teachers to discuss and plan Improvement strategies to improve their end of term grades.

Student Car Driver or Motorbike Rider Application Form

The form will need to be signed by a parent/carer and then returned to the Care Group Teacher.
